



Our team conducted extensive research on the importance of constructing a student center at CCNY (City College of New York), tailored to meet the diverse needs of college students.

Through a thorough examination of various scenarios and surveys among CCNY students, we gleaned insights into their preferences. Our analysis revealed a significant consensus, with 73.1% of students advocating for academic support within student centers, while 69.2% underscored their necessity for organizing social events and extracurricular activities. Our primary goal throughout this process was to underscore the paramount importance of establishing a student center at CCNY. By prioritizing student input and democratic principles, we concluded that any such facility must align closely with student preferences, serving as both a conducive space for academic pursuits and a hub for social gatherings.

Our research group has concluded that constructing a student center should be the main priority for improving student life at CCNY. This center would be a central location for various activities, including studying, social events, student leadership, participation, relaxation, and socialization. By implementing such a center, CCNY students would benefit from a wide range of opportunities that would help them succeed during and after their college years, significantly improving their overall experience.

Action Plan:

With a commitment to exceeding student needs, our action plan outlines the key steps to develop this student center tailored to meet the needs of our campus. The student center would be at the campus entrance, but we would have to remove the High School and relocate it. The building itself would be about 34,000 square feet (about the area of a large mansion), featuring three floors and a basement level, allowing it to enhance the student experience within the campus community.

For the basement, it will be known as a study haven. A floor where students can come into small rooms and study or work on any type of material. The floor will feature 25 small

rooms ranging from 50 to 75 square feet (about twice the area of a queen-sized bed) each, designed to accommodate an individual or a pair, and equipped with a desk and chair. In addition, there will be five larger cubbies that range from 75 to 150 square feet (about half the area of a parking space) each. These spaces may accommodate one to three individuals and provide space for additional furniture such as a table, chairs, and a small whiteboard. These cubbies will be glass and soundproof walls making it more suitable for students to enjoy their study sessions without any disruptions.

Our first floor is designated as the main center, intended for students to relax, and eat meals in a comfortable environment. This would include a lunchroom ranging from 500 to 800 square feet, inside which would be about 25 circular tables. While outside the lunchroom, you will find two vending machines including drinks and snacks. In addition, students will have the

opportunity to buy from a coffee shop, offering delightful beverages and snacks to fuel study sessions and relaxation. Plus, students can browse and shop from our campus's very own merch store, offering a range of apparel, and accessories to show off your school spirit in style.




Fig. 3: Floor Plan for First Floor




Fig. 4: Floor Plan for Second Floor




Fig. 5: Floor Plan for Third Floor
